## CARING FOR INFANTS AT-RISK FOR ZIKA

If you suspect Zika virus infection, please call and report to Maricopa County Department of Public Health (MCDPH) at **602-506-6767** within 24 hours.

## **Management of Infants with Zika Virus Exposure**

The Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends that all infants who are born to mothers with positive or equivocal Zika test results should receive the following screenings within 1 month of birth\*:

Infant screenings to be completed within 1 month of birth*
☐ Zika PCR & IgM testing through Arizona State Public Health Laboratory or commercial laboratory (within 2 days of birth)
□ Standard well-baby visit ( <b>2-5 days after birth</b> )
□ Eye exam by an ophthalmologist
Automated auditory brainstem response (ABR) hearing screening
□ Head ultrasound
Standard well-baby visit (1 month after birth)

<sup>\*</sup>Review care from delivery hospital to determine what screenings have already been completed

## **Continued Routine Monitoring & Referral**

Infants infected with Zika virus before birth may present with a specific pattern of birth defects known as congenital Zika syndrome. Latent developmental or physical delays may also occur. Monitor child's development and growth with routine well-baby visits and refer early to services and specialists through regular avenues, if determined to be needed.
